

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION:

St Joseph's Catholic Church is in the typical Early English Gothic revival style. It is sited at the south-west corner of the intersection of Martin and Watton Streets. With its historic extensions, it is now cruciform in plan. The façade incorporates a doorway, tripartite lancet window and belicote. The walls are constructed of coursed local bluestone. The roofs are slate with ventialtors immediately below the ridge line. The interiors are typical of the period and style although the altar reflects the liturgical changes of the Second Vatican Council. Both the interiors and exterior are in excellent condition and retain a very high degree of integrity.

The presbytery is a single storey, asymmetrical red brick house in the Edwardian or Federation Queen anne style. It is sited immediately to the south of the church.

HISTORY:

Land was reserved for the Roman Catholic Church in the Township Plan in Kennedy Street between Cobb and Ritchie Streets, of equal size with the Anglican and Presbyterian denominations but the furthest from the centre of the township and the Police Reserve. For some reason, this site was not developed and the present site in Martin Street now has the church, presbytery and school. This site comprises allotments 1, 2, 3 and 4 of section 8 of the Township Plan. Allotments 1 and 2 were originally purchased from the Crown by a F. Forster, allotment 3 by a W. Waller, and allotment 4 by a P. W. Flower. All were sold on 15th December 1857.

St Joseph's Catholic Church, Penshurst was designed by the Hamilton architect, James Henry Fox (Tonkin, 59). He called for fresh tenders "in consequence of alterations to the design" (ibid.). Fox designed and supervised several other churches in what is now the Southern Grampians Shire, notably Holy Trinity Church, Coleraine and St Andrew's Presbyterian (now Uniting) Church, Branxholme. Extensions to St Joseph's in 1897 were designed by the architect, Frank Hammond who lived in Penshurst and who designed the extensions to the Catholic Church in Hamilton. The names of the builders are not known.

It is not known who designed or built the presbytery but it appears to date from after 1900 and may have replaced an earlier building. The former school was a weatherboard building which was removed after the Second World War. The foundation stone for the present school was laid on 18th November 1956 by the Most Rev. J. P. O'Collins D.D., Bishop of Ballarat when the school was "blessed and opened". The Parish Priest was Rev. P. Bushell. The builder was W. J. Henry & Son, who may have been responsible for the design.

St Joseph's Catholic Church is located on west side of Martin Street between Watton and Cobb Streets in the centre of Penshurst. The building is in the Gothic revival style using local bluestone. It was designed by Architect James Fox of Hamilton, who was responsible for the designs of many churches in Western Victoria in the nineteenth century. Extensions to St Joseph's in 1897 were designed by the architect, Frank Hammond who lived in Penshurst and who designed the extensions to the Catholic Church in Hamilton. The names of the builders are not known. Both the interiors and exterior are in excellent condition and retain a very high degree of integrity. The presbytery is a single storey, asymmetrical red brick house in the Edwardian or Federation Queen Anne style. It is sited immediately to the south of the church. How is it significant? St Joseph's Catholic Church, Presbytery and School are of historical and architectural significance to the Southern Grampians Shire and the township of Penshurst. Why is it significant? St Joseph's Catholic Church, Presbytery and School are of historical significance as the focus for that denomination in the area. The church is of architectural significance for its typical use of the Gothic revival style and as a work of the local architects, James Henry Fox and Frank Hammond. The Presbytery is of architectural significance for its conventional and essentially domestic style and form and for its aesthetic support of the church.
