EXTENT OF LISTING:

To the extent of: 1. All the exteriors of the cottage and all of the land in a radius of 20m of any edge of the bluestone cottage, not inleuding any of the outbuildings.

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PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION:

O'Briens cottage is a small, single storey bluestone cottage which is symmetrical about the front door, and may date from as early as the 1860s. The cottage has double hung sash windows and a timber verandah, which probably was constructed after the house. The verandah has simple timber brackets and a bullnose profile. The roof over the front two rooms is hipped and corrugated iron, while the roof over the rear two rooms is also hipped and corrugated iron and extends over service area. Bluestone chimneys on the side elevations are associated with three out of the four front rooms. There is a red brick chimney at the end of service wing. The last rooms of the service wing are in weatherboard.

HISTORY:

The land on which O'Brien's Cottage and the associated garden now stand was purchased from the Crown by Joseph Hammond. Hammond also purchased the adjacent allotment Q, of section 11, and, allotments R, S, T, and V of section 12 of the Parish of Boramboram. Nobody by the name of Joseph Hammond is rated as an occupier in the first rate book nor as an owner in later ratebooks. The Victorian Pioneers Index shows that Joseph Hammond and Helena Thompson had eleven children between 1844 and 1858. The births of the children indicate that the couple started in Melbourne, and moved to Port Fairy (then known as Belfast), and in 1854, one of their children was born at Mount Rouse (VPI, Reg No. 2715). It appears that while in Mount Rouse, the land was purchased, and then after returning to live in Belfast (where another two children were born) the land may have been subdivided and sold.

It is not known exactly when the cottage was built, but it is thought to date from the 1860s. Very little is known about the owners or occupants of the cottage until the 1950s, when the property was owned by William and Gladys O'Brien.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

What is significant?

O'Briens cottage is located on the south side of the Hamilton Highway, approximately 3.0kms north-west of the township of Penshurst and opposite the intersection with Cemetery and Cook Lanes. The cottage is a simple, vernacular 1860s bluestone cottage set in a garden from the same period. It was owned for many years by the O'Brien family. There has been no architect or builder associated with the design. The cottage is in fair condition, remaining relatively intact, including the usual extensions and modifications but one chimney has collapsed with part of north-west wall. The cottage retains a high degree of integrity.

How is it significant?

O'Brien's Cottage, Hamilton Highway is of historical and architectural significance to the Southern Grampians Shire and to the township of Penshurst.
